County Lines Filming for a National PSHE Campaign

20 students from Year 9,10 and 11 appeared in a short film filmed at Kenton School. The film will be shown all over the country in school PHSE lessons to educate young people on the subject of County Lines. This educational resource was made by the Violence Response Unit at Northumbria Police in conjunction with Northern Stage. The students worked with a professional film crew and appeared as students in the fictitious school within the film. It was a marvellous experience for the students who filmed from 15:00pm to 19:00pm on two consecutive nights. The director Katja Roberts said 'Thanks so much for making the shoot possible and I'm really pleased the kids got something out of it too. 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Super Start to 6th Form

After some of our best A-Level results last summer, our current Sixth Formers have made an outstanding start to this academic year. Already this year we've had lectures in to support with English Language, English Literature and Media, all of Year 12 competing in the Natwest National Skills Challenge with the winning team heading to the National Final on October 18th. On top of this we've had early UCAS entries from Year 13 for Oxbridge and medical courses, fantastic attendance to our Personal Statement seminars, Sports Leadership delivery and dozens of students being nominated for the Sixth Form Council and reading partnership to support students in Year 7.



Excellent Extra Curricular

Kenton school is extremely proud of it's extra curricular offer and many students have already started to reap the physical, social and emotional benefits of engaging in sport and physical activity. We are proud to introduce a Mega Monday starting after half, offering girls only trampolining, rock climbing and football. For the boys there is football and basketball as well as mixed fitness. Well done to our football teams so far, they have made an excellent start in the leagues and cup.

Peer to Peer Reading Project

Groups of students in year 7 and year 8 have begun an exciting new peer-to-peer reading project, in conjunction with the SEMH service at Newcastle City Council. The project aims to develop students' confidence in reading with fluency and expression, alongside developing their connections with themselves and others. Students in year 8 act as mentors to the year 7 students, choosing specific reading strategies to utilise while reading their chosen book and supporting year 7 students. The students are developing lovely relationships with each other and becoming more competent and confident readers; one y7 girl commented that she enjoyed the project as she never used to like reading in groups, but does now. We know, over the coming weeks, we'll see an even greater impact!
