Safeguarding

Incel Culture and 'Manosphere'

The new Netflix series 'Adolesence' has highlighted a rise of Incel communities (Involuntarily Celibate) and the influence on young people and is being watched and discussed by a lot of people currently. It is a very powerful drama highlighting the risks of this culture.

It is important that we are aware of this online subculture and recognise warning signs. The term incel stands for involuntarily celibate and refers to men who believe they are unable to attract romantic relationships despite wanting to. This culture can impact on the boy's behaviour and attitudes, but could also be used by others to insult or bully e.g. by a girl to a boy online.

Some incel communities foster resentment towards women and blame them for their perceived misfortune. This can lead onto the promotion of misogyny, victimhood and sometimes radicalisation within these communities (mainly online).

- Red pill emoji (%): symbolises an awakening to the "truth" about
- gender dynamics, commonly referenced in the manosphere • Dynamite emoji (): represents an "exploding red pill," indicating
- someone identifying as an incel
- 100 emoji (2): associated with the "80/20 rule," a belief that 80% of women are attracted to only 20% of men, suggesting a skewed perception of attraction
- Kidney bean emoji (I): used to signify incel identity, possibly linked to certain online memes
- Red heart emoji (): love or deep romantic feelings
- Purple heart emoji (): sexual desire or "horny" intentions
- Yellow heart emoji (⁽): interest and flirtation (asking "are you interested?")
- Pink heart emoji (): emotional interest without sexual intent
- Orange heart emoji (): reassurance, comfort, or "you're going to be fine"

Key Incel Terminology

Red Pill - From The Matrix, refers to 'waking up' to the 'truth' of gender dynamics, as incels perceive them.
Chad - An attractive, successful man who is desirable to all women.
Stacy - An attractive woman who is seen as prioritising men like Chad.
Becky - An average woman, often contrasted with a Stacy.
Femoid/Foid - A dehumanising term, implying women are inferior.
Black Pill - Belief that nothing changes with self improvement or effort.
80/20 Rule - A theory suggesting that 80% of women are attracted to 20% of men, fuels resentment.
Andrew Tate - A key promoter of incel ideology.

Signs to Look Out For:

- Low self-esteem
- Use of incel language
- Hostility towards women
- Isolation and secrecy
- Increased frustration & anger

Water Safety





SIMS Parent, iPay and Class Charts






It is essential that Parents/Carers are registered with SIMS Parent app. You can access school reports as well as grade sheets here.
